

49th ALL INDIA CONFERENCE OF DRAVIDIAN LINGUISTS & INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM

Session-wise Report

CONTENTS

June 28, 2022

he Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts, Banaras Hindu University in collaboration with DLA, CIIL, ICPR, AnSI and VCW organised the 49th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium. The first session was chaired by Prof. S. Kunjamma, and six research papers focusing on core areas of linguistics were presented. The papers ranged from discussing specific processes like syllable markedness in the Mappila variety of Malayalam language and intonation patterns in the Sylheti variety of Bangla language to broad studies like the phonological study of Bajjika. One of the papers also focused on polysemy in verbs. The papers ranged from descriptive studies to comparative studies between languages

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and/or varieties of languages. The languages in focus ranged from Dravidian languages Telugu and Mappila variety of Malayalam to Semitic language Arabic - compared to the Indo-European English language - and

also Indo-Aryan languages Sylheti variety of Bangla, Baijika and Sanskrit.

The chair commented on the importance of descriptive studies and their role as stepping stones for raising bigger linguistic questions.

The second session of the 49th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists International Symposium was chaired by Prof. Shobha Satyanath. The papers focused on a variety of topics ranging from core areas of study to allied areas of study in the field of linguistics. Papers focusing on core areas discussed topics like nominal forms in Hindi in the frame of conjunction verbs, the pronominal system of Banjara language, compounds in Tibeto-Burman language Maram and coined Tulu words used in formal functions. the papers that concentrated interdisciplinary areas discussed mathematical and computing of conversational meaning in order to find the underlying principle that governs the formulation of conversational meaning and another is on the changes in the body care advertisements with a particular focus on beauty metaphors.

The chair remarked on the interlinking nature of language and culture and the relative importance of syntax and semantics. The chair further pointed out the growing technological advancements and uses of linguistics in automatic tagging and programming but also highlighted the fact that humans are indispensable.

The chair also mentioned the importance of sociolinguistic approach on the study of advertisements noting the survey of consumers of different age groups and how it would be helpful in the industry.

The third session of the 49th All India of Conference Dravidian Linguists International Symposium was chaired by Shri. Gopal Parihar. A variety of research papers were presented at the session including a metrical study explained with concentric circles representing the different aspects or themes of Akam. It aimed at the presenter's socio-cultural aim of preserving and promoting old traditions and arts and highlighting the Dravidian Paradigm and presenting it to a non-Tamil audience. There were presentations studying the plural form of Erukala language spoken in Telangana, plural formation in Lambadi language, verbal forms of Bajjika, and also a comparative study of the morphological changes in word formation of Marwari in Thanwas Chakradharpur regions.

The chair applauded the presenters. As the group was diverse, concerning not just topics and themes, but also age group. Descriptive and insightful papers on Indo-Aryan and Dravidian languages were presented, showcasing the linguistic diversity of the nation.

Keynote Address: Prof G. Umamaheshwara Rao, President, LSI

Topic: Desiderata in Dravidian Studies Since Bh. Krishnamurti's (2003) The Dravidian Languages

The Keynote address of Prof. G. Umamaheshwara Rao was an inspiring and thought provoking one, aimed at motivating and also bringing forth the requirement of continuing more research in the field of Dravidian Languages. As the contemporary age has witnessed an academic drought, The keynote speaker mentioned the importance of the Right to Information in one's mother tongue as that enables and further empowers democracy. One must empower language through technology, build technological tools and contribute to the field of linguistics in respective languages.

The audience interaction also led to some important informative discussions, the keynote address was helpful in providing insight on the correct methodology and litmus tests for proper collection of data and language comparison.

The chairman Prof. Vijay Kumar Shukla, Rector BHU emphasized the need for teaching Comparative and Historical linguistics in academic institutes. The session was concluded by these inspiring words from the Chair: "Think high, think above and make sure something is achieved"

auxiliaries in Dharwad Kannada. There was also a request for evidence to distinguish between Dharwad Kannada and literary Kannada for further research.

Endowment Lecture 2:

Prof. Nagamma Reddy Endowment Lecture

After the Endowment Lecture No. 1, Prof. K. Srikumar delivered the lecture on 'Syllable coda in Malayalam: A Reappraisal' for the Nagamma Reddy Memorial Endowment Lecture. It was chaired by Prof. G. Umamaheshwara Rao. The chair commented on the different perspectives the paper put forward with respect to Malayalam syllables. An attendee asked for further elaboration on the syllable schema referring to gemination of coda on the onset.

Endowment Lecture 3:

Prof. Karuna Sindhudas Memorial Lecture

Prof. P. Vishalakshy delivered the lecture on "Bhoja's Influence on Kerala Sanskrit Grammatical Literature with special reference to Prakriyasarvasva". The lecture was of comparative nature, trying to find parallels and influences of Bhoja's sarasvatikantabharana on Kerala Sanskrit Literature. The extension and restrictions of the scope of the sutra through differences in interpretation and various differences in the views were noted. It was highlighted that the work significantly differs from Panini's Ashtadhyayi in its technological terminology. The lecture also pointed out various readings of the sutras and the Dravidian words sanctioned in Bhoja's work.

In conclusion, It was stated that Kerala Grammarians do not blindly follow 'Trimunivyakaranam', and both the grammatical works *Sarasvatikantabharana* and *Prakriyasarvasa* are complete and comprehensive.

The Chair mentioned his time in Thanjavur, and emphasized the importance of Indian Grammatical Traditions. The Chair also urged upcoming scholars to ponder and work in the field of modifying and improving upon existing traditional texts.

TOWARDS LINGUISTIC DIVERSITY

A gist of the speech of Prof M.J. Warsi, a prominent Indian linguist and Chairman, Department of Linguistics, Aligarh Muslim University (AMU) on the role of cultural and linguistic diversity in building sustainable societies and the value of linguistic diversity, is given below:

He was delivering the keynote address on 'Linguistic and Cultural Diversity: Some Reflections' in the Refresher Course of the University Grants Commission (UGC) Human Resource Development Centre (HRDC), University of Rajasthan, Jaipur on the topic, 'Towards Linguistic Diversity'.

Speaking on the rich culture of linguistic plurality and diversity in India, Prof. Warsi expressed the views on how Indian multilingualism is greatly increasing in prevalence and popularity.

He said: "The magnitude of linguistic diversity in India can be determined by the fact that according to the Census of India (2011), there were 121 major languages in India with 1599 other languages".

"The majorly spread Indo-European, Dravidian, Austro-Asiatic and Tibeto-Burman language families in India have a long history of the transmission of features and it is on the basis of these shared features, American anthropologist, Murray Barnson Emeneau published his famous article 'India as a Linguistic Area', in 1956', added Prof Warsi. He emphasized: "Despite the fact that each Indian state has adopted one or two of the official languages for doing business and governance, a number of other languages are also spoken by distinct population cohorts giving India an incredible degree of linguistic variety".

Prof Warsi comprehended Indian linguistic diversity at subnational levels but also referred to an alarming United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) study. He warned: "With 196 of its languages listed as 'endangered', India tops the UNESCO's list of countries having the maximum number of dialects on the verge of extinction. Two of these potentially extinct languages (Manipuri and Bodo) have been categorized as

'endangered' and 'unsafe' under UNESCO 2010 Schedule".

Prof Warsi pressed for learning new languages to respect cultures, lifestyles, customs and beliefs. He "Language is a precious emphasized: representing unique and distinct cultural heritage. It is the means by which culture, traditions and shared values are conveyed and preserved".

BOOK RELEASE FUNCTION

The Agricultural Dictionary in Tamil titled 'tamizh veeLaaN kalaiccoRkaLin vaTTaaraveeRupaaTTu (ISBN. 978-93-5523-064-5) akaraati' authored by Dr. N. Rajasekharan Nair, Dr. S. Raja and Dr S. Sundarabalu published by Kalachuvadu Publications, Nagercoil was released Coimbatore Book Festival held in the Codissia Trade Fair Complex, Avinashi Road, Coimbatore on 22-7-2022. Book lovers started thronging the fair complex when it was opened on Friday morning.

Prof. K. Karunakaran, Former Vice chancellor, Tamil University, Chairman of ISDL & President of Tamil Mozhiyiyal Sangam, released the volume which is a pioneering work based on the principles of lexicography and linguistics. The first copy was received by Prof. V. Thiruvalluvan, Vice-chancellor, Tamil University. Prof. Karunakaran, in his special address congratulated the authors for bringing out such a dictionary for the benefit of the academic community and society at large. Prof. V. Thiruvalluvan in his inspiring address highlighted the relevance of this kind of dictionaries since vocabulary items in the agricultural domain are fast disappearing due to the advent of modern technology in the agricultural arena. Hence it is the primary duty of lexicographers to attest such words with the original meaning in the dictionaries of this kind.

MATHILAKAM RECORDS – SOME LINGUISTIC OBSERVATIONS

Observation

The educational and social changes Travancore began with the introduction of English Education at the state level in 1834 under Svātitirunāl. Before that schools were started in Nagercoil and Thiruvananthapuram by the Prussian Missionary W.T. Ringletab and Rev. Meed of London Mission Society after 1809. By this time other schools were also started by the Christian missionaries to promote education among the poor and neglected sections of the society aimed at their missionary objectives. This paved the way for education to all the sections of the society. New opportunities were also an attraction for the learners. Within a short time many English words have crept into Malayalam.

There were many words in common use in Malayalam till the early 20th century (as given below). Their disappearance from Malayalam did not take even a century. Travancore becoming part of the Indian Union, increased use of Sanskrit and English, reforms in land tenure, tax accepting new systems of weights and measures introduced by the Govt. as part of the National policy, accepting English as the administrative language etc. etc. might have contributed to the language changes in Malayalam.

Just like language change, the question whether the change is a gain or loss for the language is also a question of fascination to linguists. In the context of globalization where the world is converging to a point, this question attains importance. No language of the world remains unchanged. But sentiments and patriotism make people think that their language is lost or contaminated. But is it not gaining through the other side when certain aspects of the language is disappearing? Certainly, it needs a lot of contemplation to decide.

The word list appended below throws light on the socio-cultural significance of the period. The agricultural importance of the period is conveyed through the weights and measures used during the period. Important information is conveyed through the coins used in the period and the general list of words which focuses on the type of land, the chief crops grown there, the compounds surrounding the houses, markets for slave trade and trade of cattle, the various taxes imposed on the various sections and professions of the people and on agricultural products, penalties imposed, the land tenure systems etc. etc.
