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### 49th AICDL & INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM - A BRIEF REPORT

The Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts, Banaras Hindu University in collaboration with Dravidian Linguistic Association of India (Trivandrum), Central Institute of Indian Languages (Mysuru), Indian Council of Philosophical Research (New Delhi), Anthropological Survey of India (Kolkata) & Vasanta College for Women (Rajghat, Varanasi) celebrated the inauguration of the three-day 49<sup>th</sup> All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium at the Malaviya Mulya Anushilan Kendra (Near Proctor's Office), BHU on 28<sup>th</sup> June 2022.

The Organising Secretary, Dr Abhinav Kumar Mishra, formally welcomed the dignitaries - chief guest Prof. Vijay Kumar Shukla (Rector, BHU), guest of honour Prof. Vijay Bahadur Singh (Dean, Faculty of Arts, BHU), Prof. R. C. Sharma (President, DLA), keynote speaker Prof. G. Uma Maheshwar Rao (President, LSI), and special guests Prof. K. Karunakaran (Hon. Chairman, ISDL), Dr Tariq Khan (Junior Research Officer, CIIL), Prof. G. K. Panikkar (Director, ISDL and Dean, DLA), Dr Amit Kumar Ghosh (Supdt. Anthropologist, AnSI), Prof. Sachidanand Mishra (Member-Secretary, ICPR) and Prof. Alka Singh (Principal, Vasanta College for Women, Rajghat, Varanasi).

The dignitaries spoke about their representative organizations and their interest areas in the field of linguistics. They addressed the interdisciplinary nature of linguistics with newly emerging disciplines like forensic cognitive linguistics, linguistics, neurolinguistics, and language and law. The Chief Guest, Prof. Vijay Kumar Shukla. released the books - Grammar Ramacaritam by Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan, Tagore's Gitanjali: Its truth, beauty and significance and influence on Malayalam Literature by K. Jayakumar I.A.S., Mappila Migrants in Andamans - A Sociolinguistic Study by Dr. N. Muraleedharan Nair, and A Socio-cultural, historical and linguistic Study of the Pathans of Kerala by Dr S. Abdul Samed. Following this he presented awards to noteworthy contributors.

Following the event, Dr Praveen Gatla, Assistant Professor, Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts, BHU, proposed vote of thanks to all guests and participants for gracing the occasion with their solemn presence. As the contemporary age has witnessed an academic drought. The speaker mentioned the importance of the Right to Information in one's mother tongue as that enables and further empowers democracy.

In the course of the three day seminar, seven endowment lectures were delivered by some of the most celebrated and respected scholars in India. As many as 70 research papers were presented by linguists all over the nation with diverse linguistic background, in both offline and online mode. The 'best paper' award was given to Ms. Iram Ali Ahmad on her paper "Sarcastic Hindi Newspaper Headlines: A sentiment based study".

In the valedictory session, the organizing secretary, Dr. Abhinav Kumar Mishra concluded this conference by expressing his immense gratitude to all the dignitaries, the sponsors, the collaborators and all active participants for making this event a huge success. Prof. Raj Nath Bhat was given an official farewell on his retirement and all his peers and students felicitated him. It was unanimously agreed upon that the 49<sup>th</sup> AICDL, organized by the Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts was one of the very first successful mega event post-pandemic.

### DLA LIFE MEMBERSHIP FEE ENHANCED

The General Body meeting of the Dravidian Linguistic Association of India held at the Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi has unanimously decided to enhance the life membership fee of DLA from Rs. 3000/- to Rs. 5000/-. The foreign Membership fee is fixed to the equivalence of Indian Membership fee in US dollars. The life membership fee can be remitted in five equal monthly installments at the rate of Rs. 1020/- for every month (total 5100/-). This enhancement will come into effect from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2023 onwards.

### **Eighth All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists**

The eighth All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists was held in the fourth week of June 1977 at the Madurai University under the joint auspicious of the University of Madurai and the Dravidian Linguistic Association of India. The inaugural function began with a welcome address by Prof. M Shanmugham Pillai. The Hon. Education Minister of Tamil Nadu C. Aranganayakam inaugurated the conference. In the inaugural address he traced the development of Dravidian linguistic studies in the South. He concluded the speech with an appeal to all scholars to prepare historical dictionaries, encourage

learning and research and undertake rigorous studies of dialects and socio linguistic studies of Dravidian languages to serve the wider interest of the languages, people and nation. Dr. V.C. Kulandasamy the Vice Chancellor stressed the need for the functional core of language for bringing the knowledge of science and technology to the common man with a useful technical terminology, reforms of Tamil script and the adoption of Roman script for the benefit of non Tamils. Dr. George Jacob the Chairman of the Governing Council of the International School of Dravidian Linguistics unveiled the portrait of Bishop Caldwell and pointed out that Caldwell's Comparative Grammar was a model for John Comparative Grammar of Indo-Aryan Beam's languages. Prof. V.K.R.V. Rao in the keynote address pleaded for a language movement in India. He also argued in favour of retaining English along with Hindi for international contact and to simplify the teaching of languages by making use of common vocabulary borrowed from others and use a common script. Dr. J. Neethivanan proposed vote of thanks in which he expressed gratitude for the financial assistance received from different sources.

#### **Academic sessions**

About 210 delegates from India and abroad attended and more than 190 papers were presented and discussed. The languages covered were Kannada, Malayalam, Tamil, Telugu, Hindi, Marathi, Punjabi, Sourastri, Urdu, Prakrit, Sanskrit and the following Tribal languages, Maladi (South Arcot Dishit) Urali Kurumar, Muduga and Arayar (Kerala), Dhangie (Nepal), Kubi (Odisha), Bette Kuruba (Karnataka).

### Special Lecture

Dr. P.R.G. Mathur, Special Officer, Tribal Research Institute, Kozhikode made a special lecture on three minority languages viz. Mappilas, Reddies and Brahmins of Kerala.

#### **Panel Discussions**

A panel discussion on the "Coinage of Technical terms" was also conducted. Sri. V.I. Subramoniam, P.C. Ganeshasundaram, J.S. Kully, T. Donappa, P. Somasekharan Nair, B. Radhakrishna, G. Sambasiva Rao and M. Shanmugham Pillai participated in the panel discussion.

#### **Endowment Lecture**

An endowment lecture to evaluate Caldwell's Comparative Grammar was delivered by Dr. D.N.S. Bhat.

### Entertainment

A Folk dance "Devar Attam" by Kamplattu Naikkar and a music concert by Satya Sai Balasaraswathi were also performed.

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## MATHILAKAM RECORDS – SOME LINGUISTIC OBSERVATIONS

(Continued from the May issue)

#### SENTENCE TYPES

The general pattern of sentences in Matilakam Records is that the sentences are too long running to about half to one page in length. The long sentences are formed by conjoining various phrases with conjunctive marker -um as in sentence 6 below. Short sentences are very rare and restricted to a few palm leaf manuscripts. Examples of the short and long sentences are given below. Generally speaking, in most of the manuscripts the number of sentences are very limited and the whole subject matter is contained within a single long sentence. The structure of the sentences is not much different from that of Modern Malayalam. Present tense is expressed by verb forms such as natappu, iruppu etc. as in sentences 1 and 5 below. The enclosed wordlist on verb endings is indicative of the various tense forms.
