Report

In the second session which was chaired by Prof. L. Ramamoorthy, Prof. Aejaz Mohammed Sheikh presented the paper *Language contact across time: A study of Kashmiri Lexicon*. He discussed the influence of the Sanskrit, Persian and Urdu languages on the lexicon of Kashmiri. It also attempted to trace the changes that occurred at different linguistic levels, especially the phonological, vis-à-vis the process of nativization. Dr. P. Sreekumar presented a paper titled *Reforming Teaching Linguistics in India in the Context of NEP 2021 and Outcome-based Education (OBE)*. It was an attempt to develop a pedagogic model to restructure, reform and decolonize linguistics teaching in India and proposed certain pedagogic models for the teaching of linguistics in India according to the framework of NEP 2021 and OBE. He discussed how colonial narratives shaped linguistics in India and argued that the discipline of linguistics must be reformed to strengthen linguistic solidarity. Dr. Renuka Devi presented a paper on *Gender Discrimination: Being born a woman entails facing discrimination*. She discussed various causes of discrimination and stated some important constitutional provisions for the empowerment of women.

The first parallel session in the Multimedia classroom, Department of Linguistics was chaired by Dr. Darwin L. There were six presentations in this session. The paper *Language Mixing in the Contact Languages of Northern Kasargod: An Exoskeletal Analysis* by Ritu Santh explained the nature of shared linguistic patterns among the non-standard contact varieties of Kannada, Malayalam, Tulu (three South Dravidian languages) and Konkani (an Indo-Aryan language) in the linguistic convergence area at Kerala-Karnataka border. Dr. G. Palanirajan presented a paper on *Case Suffixes and Postpositions in Tamil*. This paper discussed how traditional grammars especially Tolkappiyam treated case markers and postpositions in the section on VeeRRumaiyiyal of Collatikaram. Dr. L.R. Prem Kumar and Pankaj Dwivedi presented a combined paper on *Negative in Finite Verb - A Comparative Study of Tamil and Saurashtri*. This paper discussed the structural features of negatives

in finite verbs in Tamil and Saurashtri and their relation with Indo-Aryan languages like Marathi. Catherine Ann Michael and Dr. Reenu Punnoose presented their paper on *Malayalam-Tamil Language Contact in Palakkad: the Case of Rawthers and Tamil Brahmins*. The study focused on two Malayalam-Tamil contact varieties spoken by two ethnically distinct communities in Palakkad—the Rawthers and Tamil Brahmins and explained how and in what ways languages change and how two or more language systems interact and influence each other in creative ways. Ms. Salsanath presented her paper on *Writing System Used in Ozhukku*. She explained various other scripts along with her focus area. Dr. Syam S.K. presented *A study on the cultural significance of Mannan Tribes*. He narrated the important cultural aspects and ethnic peculiarities of the Mannan tribal communities of the state of Kerala.

The second parallel session in the Multimedia Classroom, Department of Linguistics was chaired by Dr. Syam S.K. There were five presentations in the session. Dr. M. Selva Durai's paper was on the *Koraga Tribal Community in Karnataka*. He discussed the life and culture of the Koraga community settled in Karnataka. Dr. Suresh P. presented his paper *The Contribution of the Vettakadu Irula Tribal Community to Folk Medicine in the Coimbatore District of Tamilnadu*. He discussed the Irula community's traditional medicine practices and their strong belief in traditional medicine. The Vettakkadu Irulas cure patients using animal meat in addition to herbs and other natural ingredients.

Dr. Arul Dayanand together with Dr. S. Prema presented a paper on *Malappulaya documentation: A threatened endangered language*. This paper was a description of one of the endangered languages of Kerala Malappulaya. It was an audio-video documentation corpus for the Malappulaya language that could be used for many different things, as well as a basic sketch of the grammar and an online dictionary. Dr. Lijisha A.T. and Dr. Darwin L. presented *Seasonal terms and knowledge*

of the Cholanaikka tribe in Kerala, Western Ghats; *A Cognitive semantics analysis*. This paper was an attempt to analyze the seasonal terms of the Cholanaikka people using the perspectives of Cognitive linguistics. Dr. Darwin L. presented his paper on *Cases in Malayalam – A Corpus-Based Linguistic Study*. He tried to find out the occurrence of the case markers and the possibility of the collocational or colligational conditioning of the occurrences of the case markers using corpus-based morphological analysis.

The third parallel session in the multimedia classroom was chaired by Prof. S.A. Shanavas. There were four presentations in that session. Prof. K. Sreekumar's paper was on *Directed Manners of Motion in Malayalam*. Prof. B.S. Khaira's paper was on *Tones in Punjabi*. The paper was an attempt to explore the features of tone in the Punjabi language. A tone in the Punjabi language is a distinctive feature that provides a unique place to Punjabi among Indian languages. The tone in Punjabi language is lexically significant, contrastive but with a relative pitch on each syllable.

Dr. Vijayarajeswari presented *Issues in translating Mudhuvan tribal language poems into Tamil*. She pointed out the difficulty in translating the literature of tribal languages into Tamil. Prof. M.C. Kesava Murty presented a paper on *Split Intransitivity and Argument Realization in Telugu*. This paper attempts to address the argument realization, particularly in the case of unergative and divergent verbs in Telugu.

The first technical session at V.I. Subramoniam Memorial Conference Hall commenced with Dr. Kakali Mukherjee as the session chairperson. The technical session opened with the presentation of Dr. Mukherjee on *Tibeto-Himalayan Languages – A Brief Overview*. The presentation covered the complete deliberation on the key aspects of Tibeto-Himalayan Languages. The next paper was on *The Comparative analysis of Hindi and Bangla Tongue twisters* by a group of young scholars, Suvam Sen, Abhijeet Satsangi & Siddharth Chauhan. The

presentation was enriched with examples from both languages and grabbed the interaction from the delegates. The third presentation, *Problem in Detecting Bengali Homophones in Speech-to-Text System* by Suvam Sen threw light on the semantic ambiguities in processing using computational tools. The last presentation was on *E-learning methodologies in a second language learning classroom* by Avik Mukherjee. The presentation brought out how effectively the E-learning methodology could be utilized in second language learning. The session turned out to be highly informative and interactive with the versatile nature of scholarly presentation.

The second technical session here commenced at 11:40 AM with Prof. K. Srikumar on the chair. The session contained four presentations by young researchers on various spheres of language, linguistics and technology. The first paper was on the *Omission of words when exposed to the multi dialects* by Vijila and Fousia. The presentation contained real examples of omission of words in multi-dialect environments like the campus, and campus hostel. The next presentation was on the *Impact of Word of Day Practice in schools for improving second language communication – A Study* by Ajeesha Alex and Kavya S. Sunil. The study elaborated on the merits of the Word of the Day practice and gave suggestions for using the new words in their daily communication. The third presentation on *Kerala Youth's Language and Vocabulary as Influenced by Mass Media* was by Densha Devis & Aswini. How popular social media influenced the language of youngsters of Kerala is elaborated with examples. The last paper of the session was on *Neuroplasticity as an application in Artificial Intelligence* by Aparna S. Pillai and Rinsiya Rahim. The paper observes how Neuroplasticity works in language learning from a linguistic perspective and this paper concludes how Neuroplasticity works in the field of Artificial Intelligence. The session ended with clarification of questions and a summing up of the collective opinion by the chair.

Prof. Rajesh Bhatt completed his BTech in Computer Science at IIT Kanpur in 1993 and got his PhD at the University of Pennsylvania in 1999. He is interested in the comparative syntax of the Modern Indo-Aryan languages, the syntax-semantic interface, Tree Adjoining Grammars, and creation of linguistic resources for South Asian Languages. At the University of Pennsylvania, he worked on Tree Adjoining Grammars with the Indo-American computational linguist Aravind Joshi. His dissertation on convert modality was co-advised by Sabine Latridou and Anthony Kroch. He is currently a full professor at University of Massachusetts, Amherst. He has also taught as a visiting professor at MIT and at various LSA summer institutes, the LISSIM summer schools in India, the NYI in Saint Petersburg Russia, and the Crete Ling Summer School. He is one of the founding editors of the Journal of South Asian Languages.

LINGUISTS HONOURED

Dr. K. RAMASAMY, Former Professor cum Deputy Director, Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysuru and Former Officer in Charge, Central Institute of Classical Tamil, Chennai received the prestigious **Kalaigarnar Karunanidhi Semmozhi Tamil Award 2023** for his contribution to Classical Tamil Studies from the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamilnadu, Mr. M.K. Stalin, in the meeting held at the Secretariat, Chennai on 5-9-2023. He was honoured with a Certificate of Appreciation, a prize money of Rs. 10 lakhs and a bronze statue of Dr. Kalaigarnar Karunanidhi.



He passed M.A. Linguistics with flying colours from Annamalai university in 1972 and obtained Ph.D (Topic: A Contrastive Analysis of the Relative Clauses in Tamil and English) from CAS in Linguistics, Annamalai university in 1988. He started his career in CIIL, Mysuru. He has taught Tamil as a second language in the Southern Regional

Language Centre, Mysuru from 1983 to 2003 for the school teachers deputed by various governments. Also taught Tamil to foreign nationals from Australia, Canada, China and Sweden at different periods in the SRLC, Mysuru. He served as Director in charge of CIIL on different occasions. Organised about 100 events (meetings, workshops, training programmes, seminars, conferences etc.) relating to the plan scheme for Classical Tamil. He has assessed more than 100 Tamil books under the Grant-in-Aid scheme of CIIL.

He has several valuable publications to his credit. He has successfully supervised almost a dozen Ph.D scholars. He has organized several Refresher courses, Orientation Programmes and Workshops. He has visited institutions in Nepal, Mauritius, and Malaysia for academic interactions. His performance, both in the administrative and academic fronts in the Central Institute of Classical Tamil, Chennai attracted the Tamil language lovers and the Government of Tamilnadu alike. This is the major reason for conferring of this prestigious award to him.

Dr. R. LALITHA RAJA, Assistant Professor, CAS in Linguistics, Annamalai university was awarded the **Best Teacher Award** by Annamalai university on the occasion of Teachers' Day celebrations held on 5-9-2023. She has presented research articles in 68 National and International seminars and conferences. She has visited institutions in UK, Cambodia, Vietnam and Singapore for academic pursuits. She has also delivered 29 special/invited lectures. She has successfully supervised 9 scholars for Ph.D. She is also a *Registered Rehabilitation Professional-Special Educator* (Mental retardation). She has been training children with speech and language disabilities. Currently she is also pursuing the research project 'Communicating with Womb'.
